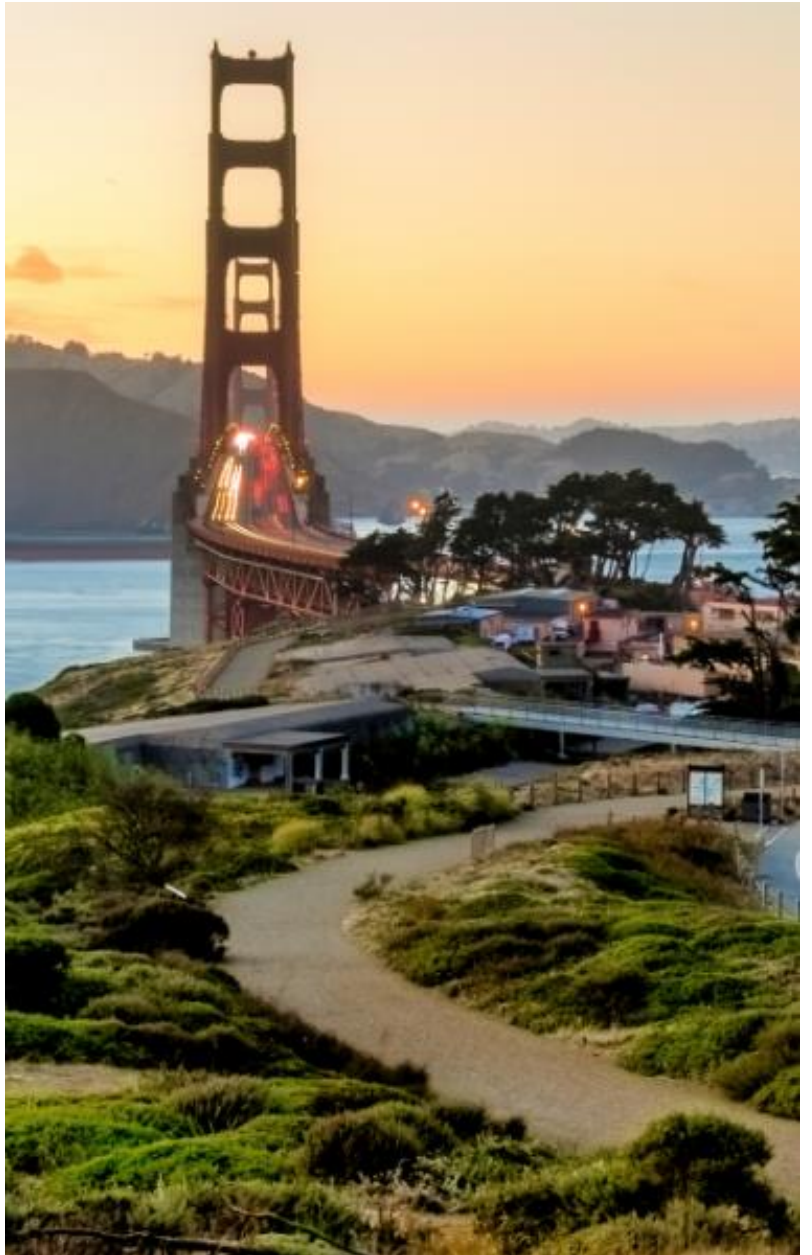

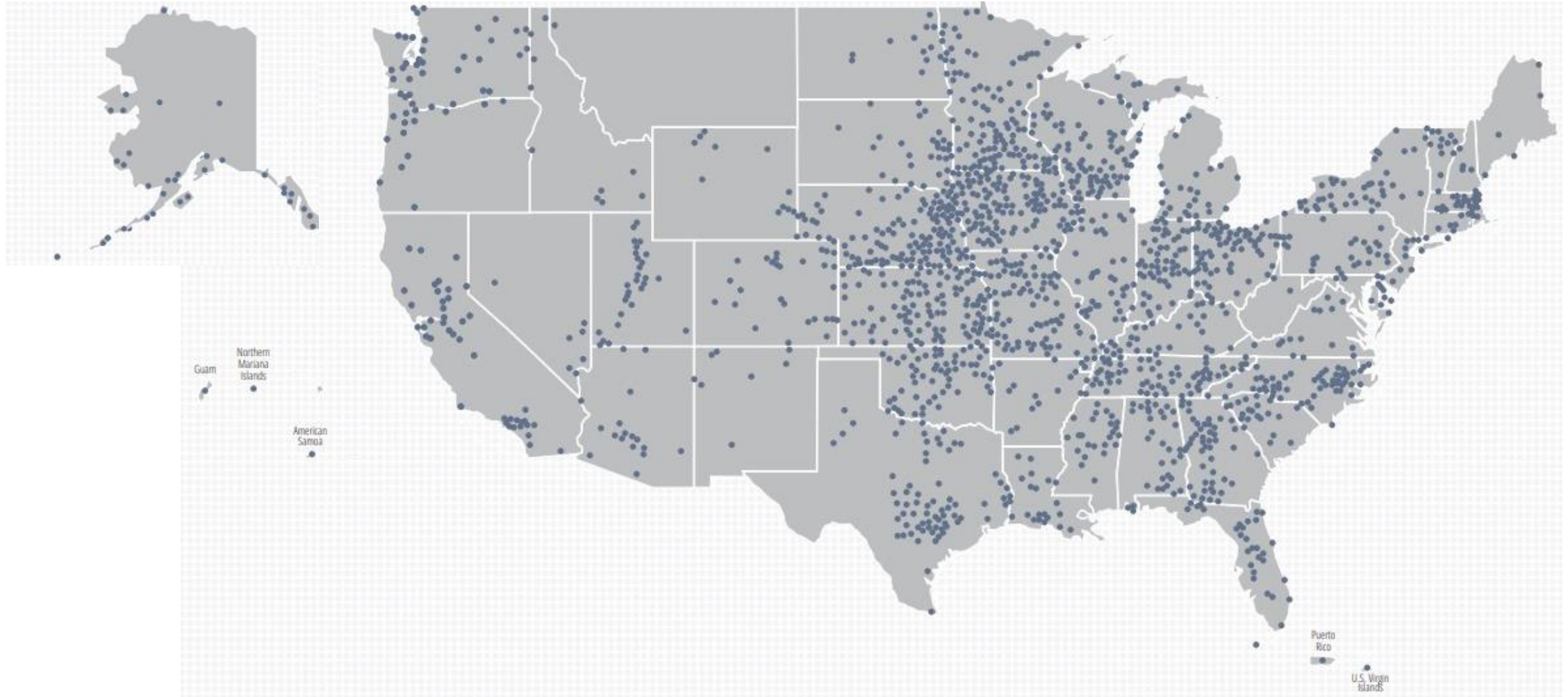


As the climate crisis grows, PG&E continues to place major obstacles in our way.

non-profit grid operator

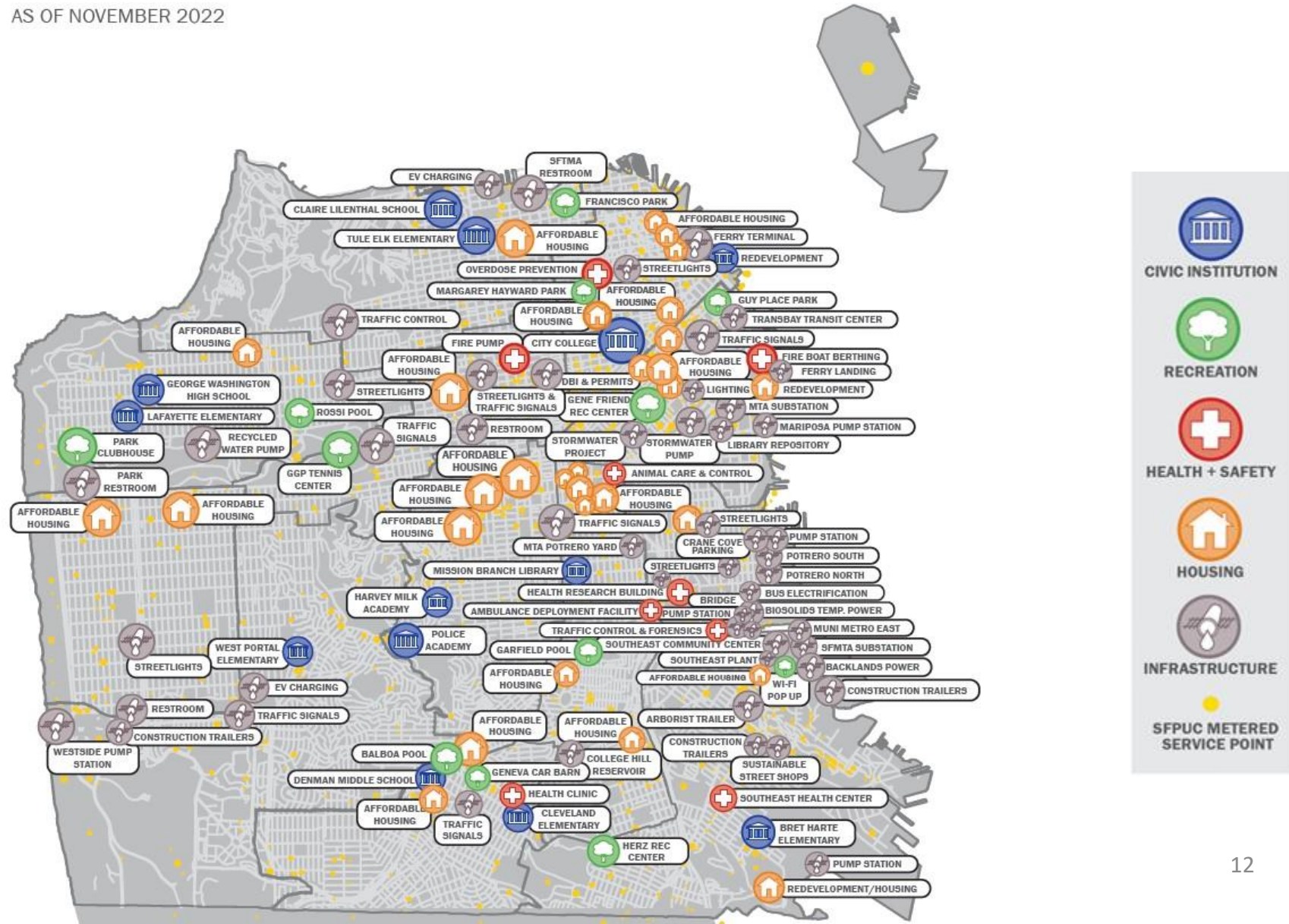
PG&E-Owned Distribution

Hetch Hetchy Power and
CleanPowerSF Customers

CleanPowerSF supply distributed by PG&E as retail service.
Customers pay PG&E for everything BUT supply.

PG&E has obstructed over 100 local projects.

PG&E's requirements are unreasonable.



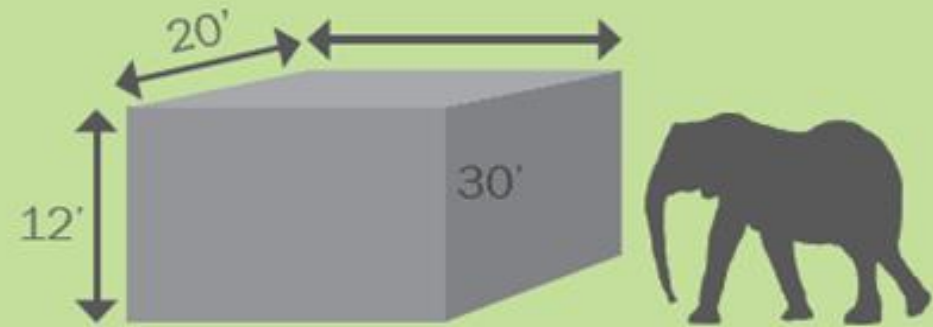

× Less transparency & accountability
